Sardinia is the second biggest island in the Mediterranean with a total surface area of 24,090 km, 1,850 km of coastline and around 1,600,000 inhabitants. It is located in the middle of the western Mediterranean Sea about 187 km from the Italian peninsula. Its territory consists predominantly of hills and highlands, whilst its central and eastern areas are mountainous with the highest peak measuring 1,834 m.

Sardinia has a special statute of autonomy that gives the regional government legislative power on topics such as administration, building policy, transports, agriculture, fishing, tourism, libraries and museums.

The coasts are characterised by a variety of landscapes such as beaches, sand dunes, cliffs and bays. Due to its geo-morphological characteristics, Sardinia has some of the most varied, original, natural and climatic ecosystems among the Italian regions. Due to its central position in the Mediterranean, Sardinia has been a land of conquest for many people coming from surrounding countries and while it is still not certain whether it was inhabited in the Palaeolithic period, it has certainly been inhabited since the Neolithic period.



The archaeological remains scattered all over the island reveal some unique characteristics of a distinct history. In fact, the island is rich in the typical Nuraghe remains, stone constructions tholos built by the original inhabitants, and the so-called "Giants' graves". You can find also ancient necropolis with *domus de janas* (rock-hewn chamber tombs). The most recent and extraordinary archaeological findings in Sardinia are the Giants of Monti Prama, powerful, majestic stone statues buried for centuries in the Sinis countryside, just 2 km from the Cabras wetlands and not far from the ancient port of Tharros, hewn from single blocks of stone which could weigh up to 400 kilos.



Sardinians are the largest ethnic minority of Italy and their language, Sardinian, which has many variations, has been officially recognised as a language by the Italian Government since 1999. Historically, Sardinian economy has been based on agriculture, farming and fishing and on the exploitation of its mineral resources since the prehistoric period. The last 10 - 15 years saw a rise of entrepreneurship and local businesses especially in the tourism sector, in the agro-food industry and the ICT.

SARDINIA ISOLA BELLA



Cagliari is the capital, the main cultural centre of Sardinia and the most populated with about 160,000 inhabitants. It is located in the middle of the Gulf of Angels, across the southern slope of Sardinia. It hosts numerous open air archaeological sites and unspoilt natural environments, such as the Regional park of Molentargius, a wetland system where flamingos nest and offer spectacular pink displays.

Every season, thanks to its particularly mild weather, Cagliari allows visitors the chance to discover its architecture, archaeology and monuments, its ancient history as well as an opportunity to discover the influences that the various people who have inhabited Cagliari have had on the town throughout its history. Cagliari is "the city of the sun" but above all "the city of the sea". From the surrounding hills it is possible to admire the multicoloured sea, which merges with the city to produce a unique panorama. Its famous Poetto beach and its waterfront offer kilometres of sandy beach, cycle lane and jogging track. Just a few kilometres outside Cagliari there are some of the most beautiful beaches in the world, with a natural environment that is still very much unspoilt.



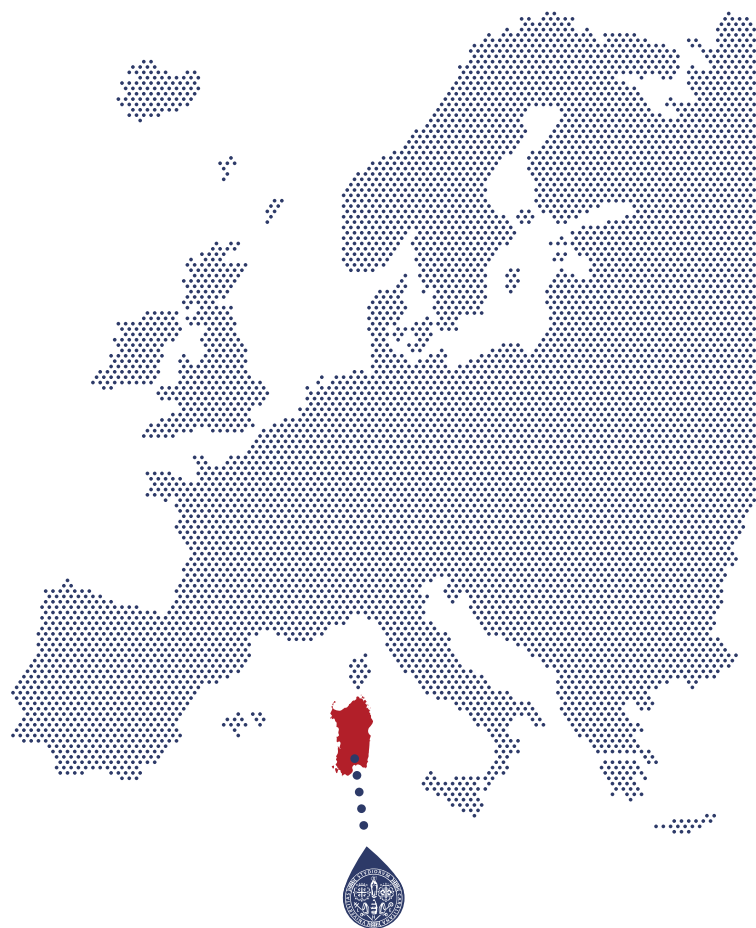

UNICA and its history



UNICA today

Founded in 1620 as the Studium Generalis Kalaritanum, the University of Cagliari is based on the old Spanish universities of Salamanca, Valladolid and Lérida.

The classes which were originally offered were Law, Latin, Greek and Hebrew Literature, the Liberal Arts, Medicine, Surgery, Philosophy and Science. However, during the 18th century Sardinia, under the rule of the House of Savoy government, significantly modified the university statute with the expansion of the science faculties and institutes.

The new university building was designed by the Piedmontese engineer Saverio Belgrano di Farnolasco and was completed at the end of the 18th century. Today it holds the Rectorate and the administrative offices. The 19th and 20th centuries saw a greater emphasis put on the research activities and the achievement of internationally acclaimed results.

The University of Cagliari is a public university. It is one of the largest enterprises in the region of Sardinia due to its international policy and studies, and its numerous agreements with prestigious universities throughout Europe and the world.

UNICA and its facilities:

The University of Cagliari is distributed in four main facilities located both in the town centre and on the outskirts:

Cittadella di Monserrato is situated within 73 hectares and it is home to Medicine and Surgery, Physics, Pharmacy, Biology and Natural Sciences, a number of departments and one of the University hospitals;

Piazza d'Armi and the area around it hosts the Faculties of Engineering and Architecture and Humanities;

Campus Sant'Ignazio hosts the Faculty of Economics, Law and Political Sciences;

The city centre is home to the programmes of Architecture in Via Santa Croce; Foreign Languages and Literature in Via San Giorgio and of Mathematics, Computer Sciences in Via Ospedale.

Specific Degree Programmes are hosted in other areas of Sardinia Region, **Oristano** with Marine biotechnologies and Management of tourism services, **Nuoro** with Nursing and Social Work and Innovation, **Olbia** with Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering.

late September - December (exams January-February)

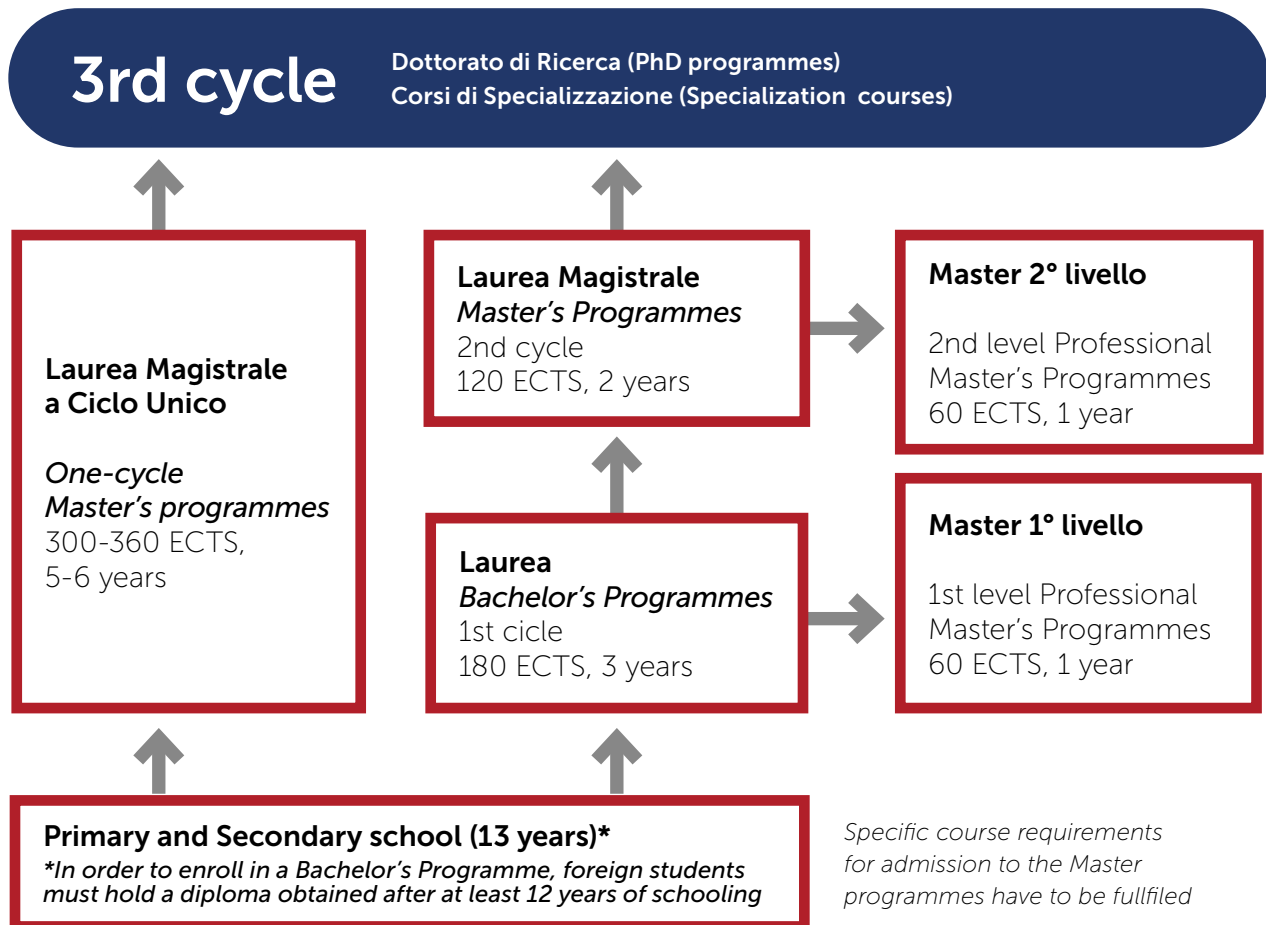

The University of Cagliari follows the Bologna Process by adopting a higher education system based on the three cycles of study.

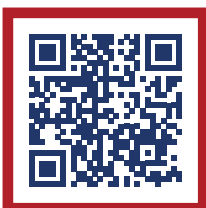


GRADING SYSTEM, ASSESSMENT, ACADEMIC RECOGNITION

UNICA has adopted the ECTS as an accumulation and transfer credit system. ECTS is a student-centred system based on the student workload required to achieve the objectives of a programme. These objectives are defined by learning outcomes and skills that will be acquired. The workload refers to the notion of time that an average student might take to complete the required learning outcomes. ECTS are used as recognition for study periods abroad; 60 credits measure the workload of a full-time student during one academic year.

Italian Credit (CFU) = 25 working hours = 1 ECTS credit

- ▶ The pass mark for examinations is 18 out of 30
- ▶ The highest mark for examinations is 30 out of 30
- ▶ An excellent performance is usually graded above 28

In order to get their degree, students are required to prepare a final dissertation to be discussed in front of a board of seven professors who award a final mark not lower than 66 out of 110.

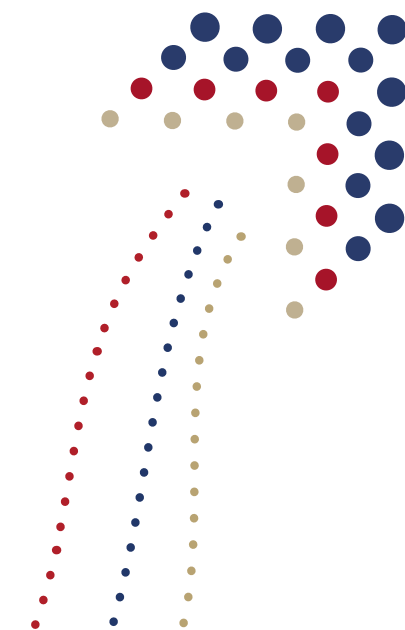

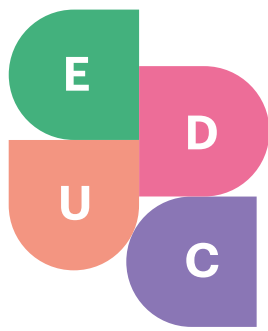

The **EDUC Alliance** (European Digital UniverCity) is a joint initiative of the Universities of Potsdam (Germany), Rennes and Paris-Nanterre (France), Masaryk (Czech Republic), Cagliari (Italy), Pécs (Hungary), Jaume I (Spain) and South-Eastern Norway (Norway). Selected by the European Commission in 2019 as one of the first "European Universities" with 6 partners, EDUC entered its second phase in 2023, expanding to include the two Spanish and Norwegian institutions.

The "European Universities" initiative aims to foster collaboration among European higher education institutions (HEIs) across various areas of education, including student, faculty, and staff mobility, as well as training, research, and innovation.

EDUC's mission is to reaffirm key historical European values, such as knowledge exchange and cultural and linguistic diversity, by creating a new teaching community that spans different cultural regions in Europe.

With a community of 200,000 students and 30,000 faculty and staff members, EDUC aims to diversify mobility opportunities, ranging from long- and short-term physical exchanges to digital course offerings and virtual classrooms, to research internships at partners' laboratories. Regardless of their social or cultural background, students will be able to customize their educational paths and benefit from European-wide learning exchanges and best practices.

In parallel and also thanks to the spin-off Horizon projects EDUC-SHARE and EDUC-WIDE, professors/researchers have the opportunity to start or reinforce their research collaborations within the Alliance, through the EDUC Research and Innovation Agenda, with the sharing of Research Infrastructures, the development of common projects and the involvement of the local ecosystems. The technical-administrative staff has in turn the possibility to exchange good practices and develop their competences for their professional growth.

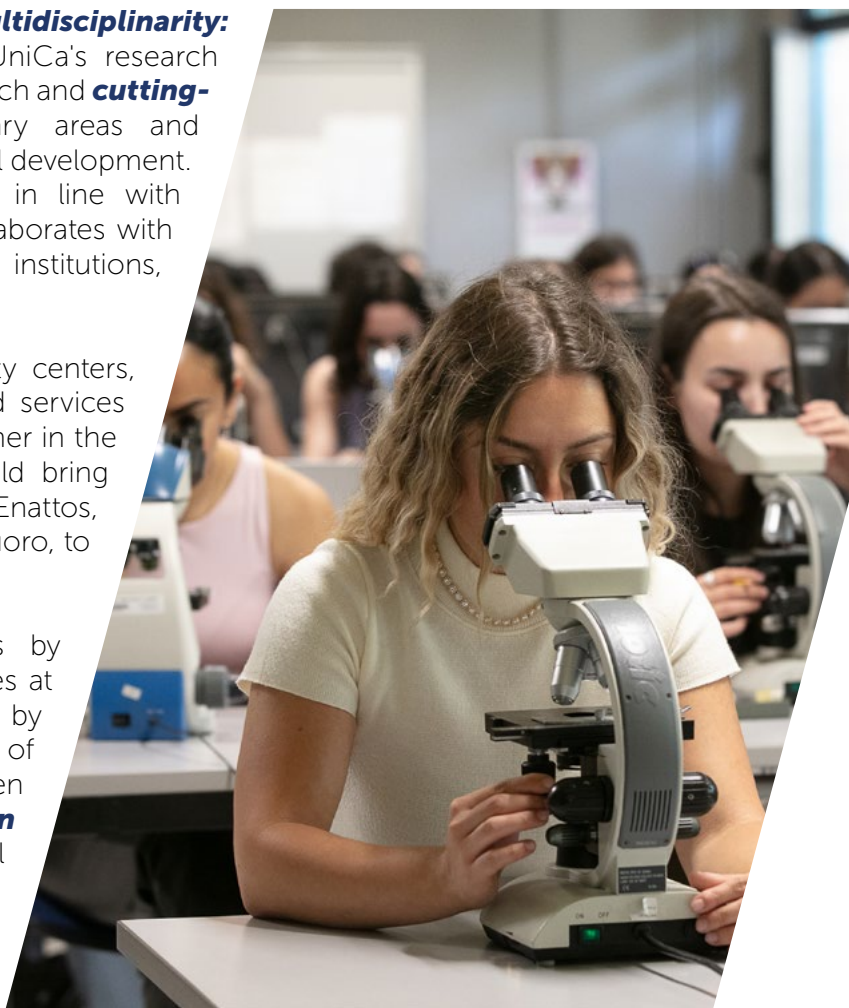
RESEARCH AT UNICA

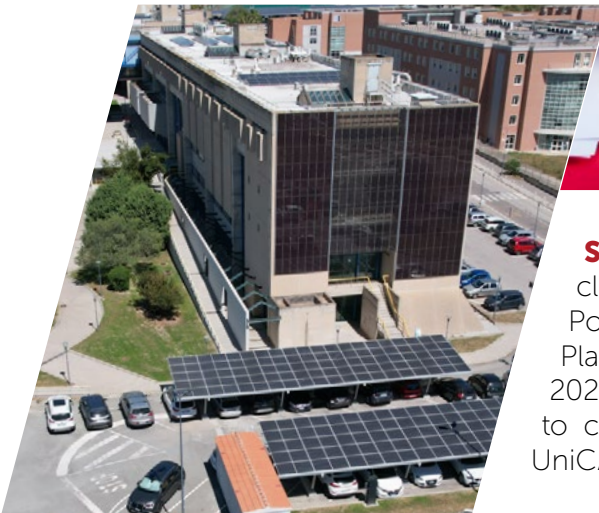

UNICA Libraries



The University Library System is organized into 4 district libraries:

- Humanities district
- Social, economic and legal sciences district
- Technological district
- Biomedical-scientific district

which coordinate 12 libraries named sections.

The libraries services are: local and interlibrary loan, document delivery, consultation of catalogues and databases, notebook/tablet loan, reading rooms, orientation and assistance in bibliographic research, internet access, information literacy, accessibility tools. It offers:

- a documentary heritage of 943,000 paper documents,
- access to 235 databases (containing e-journals, e-books, abstracts and indexes, bibliographic citations) for a total of 181,000 academic and scientific titles.

Italian language courses

The Italian language courses are designed by the university Center for Italian teaching to foreigners (CIS) and the International Office ISMOKA, to involve every aspect of the language: grammar, phonetics and vocabulary, with the aim of developing the skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking. All language teachers are native speakers and experienced professionals of high level, able to meet all the expectations of students, through both classroom lessons, and extensive tutorials in a modern language laboratory.

60-hour courses (6 ECTS) of level A1 – A2 – B1- B2 are offered through the Autumn and the Spring semesters. Online intensive courses may be offered before the start of the academic year to foreign students enrolling at UniCA.

Summer/winter school (BIP Erasmus+) on Italian language and culture

The one-week blended intensive courses are mainly reserved for the staff of partner universities, to provide skills in Italian language useful to understand and use familiar expressions of daily use.

Experienced teachers from CIS follow the students throughout the course, which includes both classroom learning and itinerant lessons on Italian culture while visiting the most important monuments and historical places of interest in the city.

Hortus Botanicus Karalitanus (HBK)

HBK (Hortus Botanicus Karalitanus) includes the Botanical Gardens and the Botanical Museum (MBK). In addition to research activities, dissemination and environmental education, among its main goals are the preservation and enhancement of plant diversity.

The Botanical Gardens, occupy 5 ha of an archaeological site between the Roman Amphitheatre and the Villa Tigellio. It hosts a Roman well and several Roman cisterns in good conditions. Collections of tropical, subtropical and Mediterranean species are present, with four greenhouses and several tanks dedicated to aquatic plants. Among the most attractive places, the palm grove, the desert area, the Roman quarry, the Mediterranean forest, the biodiversity rock gardens and the herb garden can be mentioned.




The Botanical Museum (MBK) hosts a display of antique scientific instruments and lessons dating back to the 800s and early 900s CE. It includes a collection of models made according to the ancient art of wax modelling, among which a model of the first planting of the Botanical Gardens, designed in 1867 by the head gardener Giovanni Battista Canepa, under the direction of Patrizio Gennari.

University Sports Centre (CUS)

10 competitive sports sections, around 1,000 registered athletes, more than 4,000 students with a CUS Card.

In the Sports Complex 'Sa Duchessa', in via Is Mirrionis 3, students, athletes and all CUS Card holders can find a six-lane athletics track, football pitches, the PalaCUS (a sports hall with two multi-purpose gyms), a tensile structure for volleyball and tennis, a fencing hall, four tennis courts, a playground for basketball and two body building rooms. The centre is completed by the social headquarters with its offices and conference hall, the 'CasaCUS' refreshment point and the 'StudioCUS' study room.

The other two locations of CUS Cagliari are the Polo Sportivo Monserrato, inside the University Campus of Monserrato, and the Polo Nautico in Via Calafati in Cagliari.

To use the CUS Cagliari sports centers students need a CUS Card which can be obtained at the CUS Students Office or via the CUS Cagliari website.

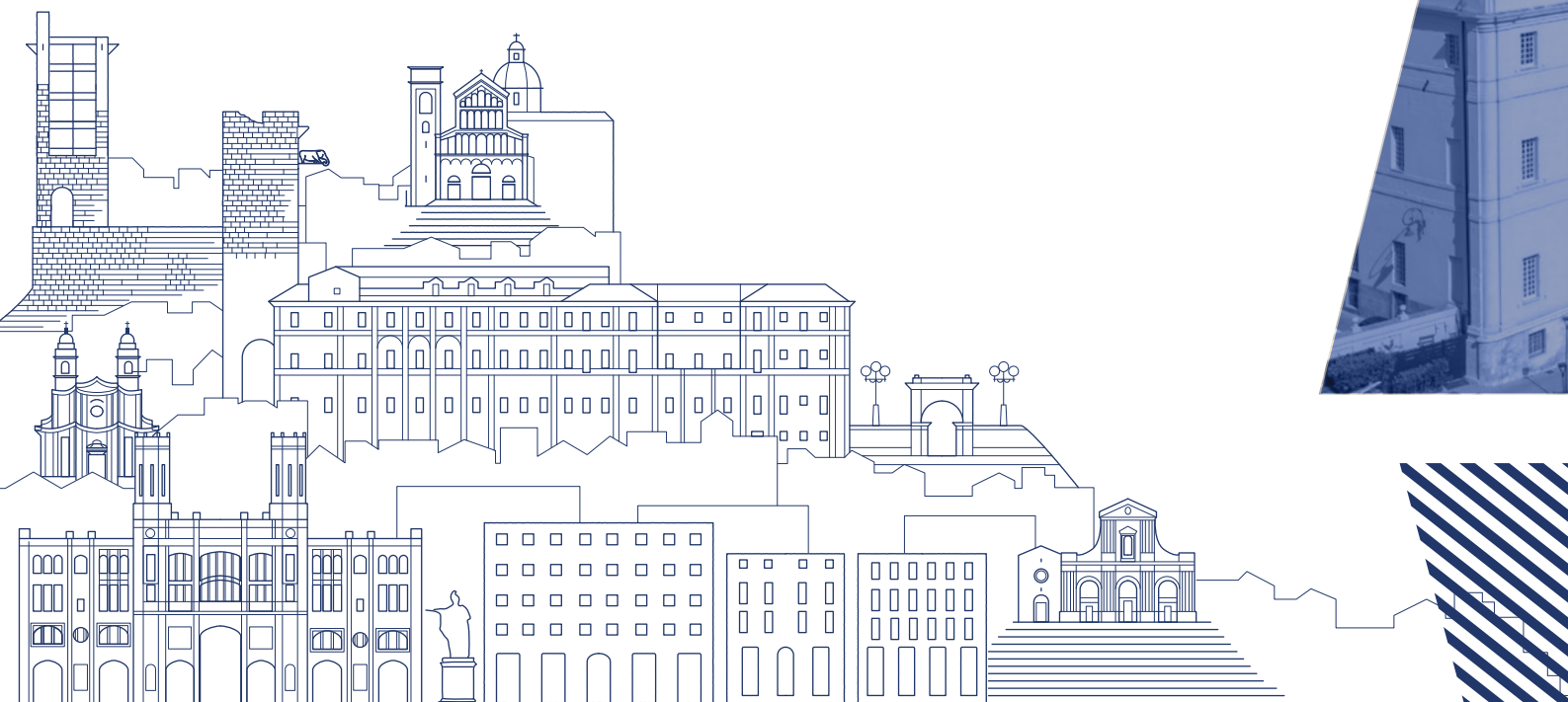
Other services, such as canteen, contributions for cultural and sports activities, are intended for the generality of students.
